Wishing you, your family and friends health and comfort as we wind up this mind-boggling year. At the EMF, we're grateful for our homes, our communities, and good books.

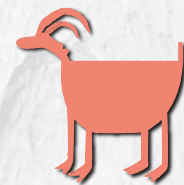

The Sirens of Mars: Searching for Life on Another World

Mars was once similar to Earth, but today there are no rivers, no lakes, no oceans. Coated in red dust, the terrain is bewilderingly empty. And yet multiple spacecraft are circling Mars, sweeping over Terra

Sabaea, Syrtis Major, the dunes of Elysium, and Mare Sirenum—on the brink, perhaps, of a staggering find, one that would inspire humankind as much as any discovery in the history of modern science.

Georgetown scientist Dr. Sarah Stewart Johnson tells the story of how she and other researchers have scoured Mars for signs of life, transforming the planet from a distant point of light into a world of its own. *The Sirens of Mars* offers an unlikely natural history of a place where no human has ever set foot, while providing a vivid portrait of our quest to defy our isolation in the cosmos.

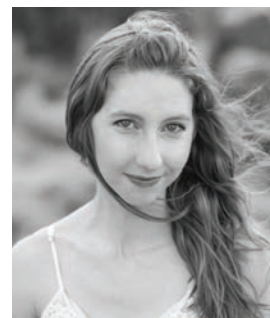

Miracle Country tells the story of Kendra's home region in Eastern California, in the rain shadow of the Sierra Nevada mountains. Kendra's parents taught their children to thrive in this beautiful landscape, prone to wildfires, blizzards, and gale-force winds. After Kendra's mother died of a rare autoimmune disease when Kendra was sixteen, the Atleework family fell

apart. The once-beloved desert came to feel empty and hostile, as climate disaster intensified. After years of avoiding her troubled home, Kendra realized that she needed to come to terms with its past and present and move back for good. *Miracle Country* is a moving and unforgettable memoir of flight and return, emptiness and bounty, the realities of a harsh and changing climate, and the true meaning of home.

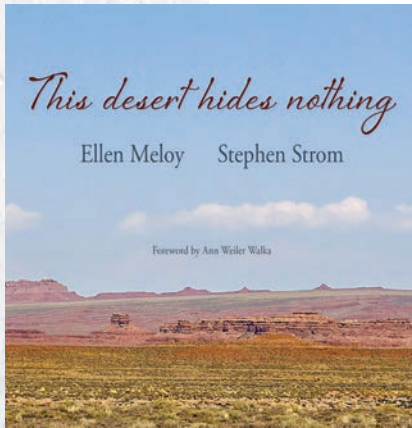

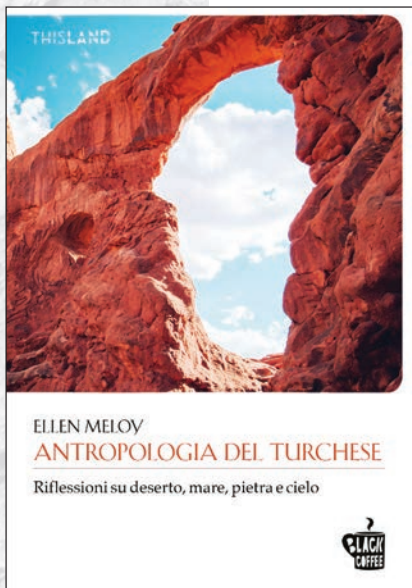
This Desert Hides Nothing

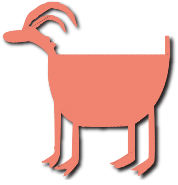

How do you say sandstone in Italian? *Arenaria*. Edizioni Black Coffee, of Florence, has released *Antropologia del Turchese*, by Ellen Meloy, translated by Sara Reggiani.

This first translation of Ellen's work, *Antropologia del Turchese*, represents a delicious irony—that Ellen lived in Italy, studied in Florence and Perugia, and at one time spoke fluent Italian. More than 50 years later, Italian readers are now discovering her work.

When I learned about the translation, I happened to be sitting in a library in Pesaro, Sara Reggiani's home town. The story of our coincidences, our meeting, friendship and trip to Bluff, is told by her in English on the Black Coffee website. Sara once described herself to me as "drawn to aridity." She had been to the Colorado Plateau, and the Gobi Desert, and I could tell when we met that she was "incantata," under the spell of the desert.

Antropologia del Turchese has received positive reviews in the Italian press. It is striking how deeply engaged the reviewers have been with Ellen's ideas, her passion, her environmentalism, her wacky, sensuous language. Thanks to Sara's own skill and passion, Ellen's words flow—the images are strong, the humor is there, and the message is clear.
